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MAY DIRECTOR SPOTLIGHT

District 5 – Steve Boedecker



Director Boedecker has been a member of Calhoun County ECA since 1992 and was first elected to serve on CCECA's Board of Directors in 2017. Steve lives at Twin Lakes with his wife Judy. They have two adult sons and three grandchildren. Steve spent 42 years working in the telecommunication industry and

credits that time for helping prepare him to serve on a board in the utility industry. In 2022, Steve was elected Vice President of the board and selected to represent CCECA on the Corn Belt Power Cooperative board. Steve is a member of the Twin Lakes Restoration Association as well as the Twin Lakes Golf Club.

As a director for CCECA, Steve has earned the Credentialed Cooperative Director Certificate (CCD), the Board Leadership Certificate (BLC), and most recently the Director Gold Credential. These accomplishments demonstrate to cooperative members a directors' ongoing commitment to advancing their knowledge of the industry and performing their fiduciary duty to the best of their ability.

Steve was asked to provide his perspective on the following three topics:

1. After serving as a cooperative director, what is something you would like your fellow members to

know about the co-op or the electric industry?

Our fellow members need to know that we as a board are working diligently to provide Safe, Affordable, and Reliable Electricity. The industry is ever changing daily to meet the demands and availability to the consumer, and we need to make sure we at CCECA are doing our best to meet those demands.

2. What trend or issue are you most concerned about in the year ahead for the co-op or the electric industry?

My biggest concern is meeting the reliability expectation of our consumers on a complicated electric grid. With the increased demand for electricity and the push for renewable energy, we have a battle on our hands. We need to make sure that all involved with energy sector keep an open mind to the fact that coal and natural gas generation is just as important as solar and wind. The fact is coal and natural gas generation are more reliable than the wind blowing and the sun shining.

3. What do you appreciate about the cooperative now that you serve as a director on the board?

I appreciate that no one is a stranger, whether it's a member-consumer coming into the office, a lineman having conversation with a member in the country or meeting with other board members. We are like one big family working to keep the lights on for our members and our employees safe.

Pole Testing Begins

The pole testing treatment and replacement program will soon begin. This spring Star Energy Services will be testing around 1,000 poles for the Cooperative.

Don't be alarmed if someone starts digging around CCECA's poles. By changing out the rotted poles and extending the life of the treated poles we will be able to provide you with even more dependable electric service in the future.

Star Energy Services will be testing poles in the following six townships: Sherman, Lake Creek, Logan, Twin Lakes, Calhoun, and Jackson. Since 2003, 25,311 poles have been inspected and 397 have been replaced.


Burley Awarded \$1,000 Basin Scholarship




Two Positions on CCECA Board Up for Election



DID YOU KNOW - The solar eclipse had an impact on solar generation across the country. We saw a significant dip in production at the cooperative's array during the hour the moon was partially blocking out the sun. Cloudy days cause a similar interruption in production which is why solar is considered an intermittent source of power.



ELECTRICAL SAFETY MYTHS



Don't always believe what you hear.

MYTH: Electricity always takes the path of least resistance

FACT: Although the path of least resistance is the easiest to take, an electrical current can take any conductive path.





MYTH: Rubber gloves and shoes will protect me from shock and electrocution

FACT: That is only true if they are 100% rubber. Most everyday gloves and shoe soles are not, and the other materials they contain can be conductors.

MYTH: Voltage has to be high to kill

FACT: Although the voltage plays a role in how strong the current flows, exposure to the current itself is what's deadly. Even lower voltages can kill.





MYTH: Heavily insulated tools will always protect against shock and electrocution

FACT: Don't let a tool give you a false sense of security; take all precautions even if a tool is marketed as safe or insulated.





Welcome Menley!


